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Mayor's Corner - The Enormous Success of Our School Traffic Safety Cameras - Thank you!

As the days get shorter and darker, I wanted to share with you a bright spot in our efforts to improve pedestrian and active transportation safety in our community.

As you know, traffic safety cameras on 178th Street near Brookside Elementary School

were changed this summer to operate 24 hours a day, seven days a week in an effort to reduce speeding on this busy corridor. The average speed on 178th prior to the change was 31 MPH - 36 MPH while the posted speed is 25 MPH.

As of this writing, the average speed is down to just under **23.5 MPH**. This is an enormous success and helps keep our children and everyone safer! Thank you for doing your part to be safe on our roads.


While some misinformed individuals are claiming that this is a money grab for the City, this assertion is simply not factually correct. Under state law, all net revenues from these cameras must go to investments to make our roadways safer for pedestrians and other users.

I will state this again so there is no confusion - the net revenues from these new cameras may not go into the City's General Fund - they must be utilized for Complete Streets safety improvements, including sidewalks and crosswalks.

Climate Policy Advisory Team Continues Work on Creation of a New Climate Element

The City's Climate Policy Advisory Team (CPAT) has been temporarily established and continues its work to advise the City on policies and regulations resulting in the addition of a climate element to the Comprehensive Plan in 2025 by:



1. Analyzing climate information to provide recommendations;
2. Reviewing and recommending Climate Element goals and policies;
3. Participating in meeting discussions to help hone the direction of the Climate Element;
4. Reviewing and providing feedback on information gathered through engagement processes to ensure the Climate Element considers feedback from affected communities, stakeholders, partner agencies, and City staff; and
5. Stewarding the process and building broad community support to enable the City to successfully adopt the Climate Element into the Comprehensive Plan.

The City welcomes public participation - numerous opportunities will be provided over the coming year for review and input.



Don't Wait to Inflate



As the weather changes and temperatures drop in Lake Forest Park, there are simple actions we can take to keep our waterways clean and healthy. One effective step you can take today is to check your tire pressure and top off as needed. Colder temperatures often lead to lower tire pressure. Don't wait to inflate!

Here are three great reasons why you should keep your


tires properly inflated:

- 1. Stay Safer on the Road:** Properly inflated tires improve vehicle handling and safety, helping you avoid blowouts.
- 2. Save Money:** Keeping your tires properly inflated can improve your gas mileage by up to 3% and extend the life of your tires.
- 3. Help Save Our Salmon:** Proper tire maintenance helps protect our local coho salmon from tire particles that release lethal 6PPD-q pollutants. Together, we can keep 6PPD and 6PPD-q out of our creeks, Lake Washington, and the greater Puget Sound watershed.

Sewer Rate Increase for 2025

The City's sewer rate has two components: King County's and the City's portions. King County assesses a fee for the cost of sewage disposal—the operation of sewage treatment plants and the maintenance of the facilities. This is the larger portion of the bill and is a true pass-through to King County, which is increasing by 5.75% (\$3.17/month) in 2025.

The City's portion, which is used for the maintenance and repair of the LFP sewer system, is increasing by 5% (\$1.07/month) to keep up with inflation and rising costs. As a result, the residential sewer bill will increase on January 1, 2025, from \$162.18 every two months to \$171.16. You will see the new rate reflected on the February 1 billing.



Lake Forest Park residents are eligible for a 24-hour early registration period prior to the start of each season's programs plus an 8% discount on all program fees (excluding rentals) throughout the entire year!
